We are pleased to have this opportunity to share some exciting new initiatives coming to Brampton, important tips regarding family safety for the upcoming season and programs that will benefit or entertain every member of your family.

Over the past several months, a number of exciting projects have been announced. After many years of advocacy, diligence and unwavering persistence, Brampton has been named one of two municipalities in Ontario to receive funding for a new university. The provincial government will provide up to \$90 million to see this long-standing goal become a reality for Brampton. An update on Brampton's new university is in this newsletter.

Brampton's downtown core has always been the 'heart' of our city. Over the years, Council has made substantial investments in rejuvenating and improving this historic neighborhood in an effort to maintain its unique contribution to the whole community. This year, Council approved a plan to transform downtown Brampton, making it more attractive, pedestrian and bicycle-friendly and environmentally sustainable. We are very excited about the construction of Ward 6's fully accessible activity hub in the City's second largest city-wide park. Located at the corner of Creditview Road and Sandalwood Parkway, it is scheduled for completion by the Spring of 2018.

Finally, the City's leadership in electric vehicle infrastructure continues – Brampton has become the first municipality in the GTA to offer a solarpowered car charging station. In May of this year, Council approved the purchase of up to ten battery-electric buses; expected to be in service by the Spring of 2018. Brampton continues to excel in its commitment to viable environmental stewardship.

We hope you enjoy the articles contained within this newsletter. We trust you'll find something interesting, something useful and something innovative about our City that makes you proud to live in Brampton.

City commits to university investment

The City of Brampton has committed to an investment strategy for a new university facility and a centre for education, innovation and collaboration in downtown Brampton. The \$50M will be spread over 10 years into a post-secondary facility, and up to \$100M into joint-use community space that could include a new central library, and entrepreneurial and cultural space in close proximity to the university facility. Specific decisions around timing, type of funding, and sources of funding will be made at a later time. Ryerson University and Sheridan College will be submitting its final proposal to the Province in Fall 2017, and the Province is expected to announce details later in the year.

Second Units update

Second units are permitted in detached, semi-detached, and townhouse dwellings, subject to zoning requirements and restrictions. In June, City Council approved changes to make second unit policies more flexible and encourage more people to register:

- **Parking** Changes in parking space width requirements so as to allow two cars to park side by side on the driveway.
- **Unit size** The second unit must be smaller than the principal dwelling.
- Registration process building permit applications and registration applications will be submitted for review at the same time, improving the efficiency of the current two-step process.
- Legal non-conforming units Waiver of \$200 registration fee for two-unit dwellings that existed before November 16, 1995.

Fully accessible activity hub coming in Spring 2018



Great things are happening! Construction has started on the Creditview Activity Hub located in the new, city-wide park at the junction of Creditview Road and Sandalwood Parkway. Second in size after Chinguacousy Park, this 100-acre park has undergone a phased construction since 2004.

When completed in Spring 2018, the Creditview Activity Hub and entire park facility including play structures and elements, will be the first of its kind to be fully compliant with the Accessibility for Ontarians with Disability Act (AODA). The entire facility, themed with a water-cycle idea, will be fully accessible for persons with physical, mental, and emotional challenges.

Solar-powered Electric Car Charging Station

Brampton has become the first municipality in the Greater Toronto Area to offer a solar-powered car charging station. It was installed earlier this year at the Brampton Soccer Centre, thanks to a grant



from the Province's Electric Vehicle Chargers Ontario program. The carport can charge up to four cars at once, and the City can sell excess power from the solar panels back to the utility.

Already a leader in providing electric vehicle infrastructure, the City now offers a total of 33 charging units at 10 locations across the City. **Eight of these locations are open to the public:**

- Brampton Soccer Centre (solar-powered carport)
- City Hall parking garage (Level P2)
- City Hall West Tower parking garage (Levels P1 and P2)
- Civic Centre (southwest corner of the building)
- Flower City Community Campus (in front of Building 1)
- Rose Theatre Brampton parking garage (Level 2)
- Sandalwood Transit Facility
- Williams Parkway Operations Centre




Winter will be here before we know it. When it snows, please

ActiveAssist fee assistance program

ActiveAssist is a fee subsidy program designed to help low-income families and individuals in Brampton participate in recreation programs. This assistance is given in the form of a credit to your account of \$275/person, per 12-month period. Confidentiality is always maintained.

To apply, complete the ActiveAssist Application Form (available online or at any recreation centre).

Applicants will need to provide proof of residency, proof of total family net income, and proof of legal responsibility for all dependents listed on the application. A list of acceptable support documentation is available on the ActiveAssist webpage and application form.

If you qualify, you can receive up to \$200 for a non-corner lot, or \$300 for a corner lot with sidewalks on two sides (if neither one is cleared by the City).
