# City commits to university investment



The City of Brampton has committed to an investment strategy for a new university facility and a centre for education, innovation and collaboration in downtown Brampton. The \$50M will be spread over 10 years into a post-secondary facility, and up to \$100M into joint-use community space that could include a new central library,

and entrepreneurial and cultural space in close proximity to the university facility. Specific decisions around timing, type of funding, and sources of funding will be made at a later time. Ryerson University and Sheridan College will be submitting its final proposal to the Province in Fall 2017, and the Province is expected to announce details later in the year.

# **Second Units Update**

Second units are permitted in detached, semi-detached, and townhouse dwellings, subject to zoning requirements and restrictions. In June, City Council approved changes to make second unit policies more flexible and encourage more people to register:

- **Parking** Changes in parking space width requirements so as to allow two cars to park side by side on the driveway.
- Unit size The second unit must be smaller than the principal dwelling.
- Registration process building permit applications and registration applications will be submitted for review at the same time, improving the efficiency of the current two-step process.

Legal non-conforming units – Waiver of \$200 registration fee for two-unit dwellings that existed before November 16, 1995.



# **Springdale Library opening soon**

After much anticipation, the new library and park at 10705 Bramalea Road are expected to open in late November. The Springdale Library Branch is an innovative, 26,000 square foot (2,415 m2) triangular building that will also offer program rooms and a seniors' space. Meanwhile, Komagata Maru Park will include a themed, accessible playground, splash pad for use in the warmer months, and a garden/water feature. The design of the space will commemorate the Komagata Maru incident and tell a broader story about immigration and multiculturalism.



# Stormwater financing study

Stormwater is the water that flows into our sewers, creeks and lakes from rain or melting snow. The City has an extensive system in place to manage this stormwater, decreasing the risk of flooding and erosion.

Like many other municipalities, Brampton's stormwater needs continue to grow as our population increases and infrastructure ages. The City is studying existing and projected stormwater needs and costs and exploring alternatives for paying for ongoing investment in this critical program. # **Pendergast Log House**

The Historic Bovaird House is getting a new neighbour — the Pendergast Log House! The Pendergast Log House is a rare cultural heritage resource built in the mid-1800s, and is one of last known surviving log houses in the city. The log house was originally located on the Pendergast Farm near McVean Drive and Countryside Drive.

The log house is being relocated to, and restored at, the Bovaird House property, where it will be appropriately integrated and programmed to ensure its long term reuse and enjoyment by the public.




# Seniors snow removal grant

Are you a senior or someone living with a permanent disability? If so, the City can help cover the cost of hiring someone to clear your snow. If you qualify, you can receive up to \$200 for a non-corner lot, or \$300 for a corner lot with sidewalks on two sides (if neither one is cleared by the City).

# ActiveAssist fee assistance program

ActiveAssist is a fee subsidy program designed to help low-income families and individuals in Brampton participate in recreation programs. This assistance is given in the form of a credit to your account of \$275/person, per 12-month period. Confidentiality is always maintained.

To apply, complete the ActiveAssist Application Form (available online or at any recreation centre).

Applicants will need to provide proof of residency, proof of total family net income, and proof of legal responsibility for all dependents listed on the application. A list of acceptable support documentation is available on the ActiveAssist webpage and application form.

# Widening driveways

Know the rules before you plan to widen driveways:

- For cutting the curb or widening the boulevard (land between road and sidewalk), you may require a permit from the City.
- For changing the landscape or grade of your property, you may also require a Fill Permit from the City. This is for the materials (soil, stone, concrete, sod etc.) that will be used on your driveway.
- There are driveway restrictions based on the size of your property
- You must also leave at least 0.6 m (two feet) of permeable landscaping between your driveway and side lot line

# **Your role in shaping City budget**

Each year the City identifies priorities, goals and initiatives that ensure good use of resources. As residents of Brampton, your input is key to the entire budget process. Stay tuned for budget discussion dates, which will be posted on **brampton.ca**.

#### What's the budget process?

- Council Members provide direction and feedback on strategic priorities to guide the budget process
- Budget Committee reviews business plans and makes recommendations to Council
- Review includes revisions and reprioritization of needs (in line with strategic priorities, costs and public input)
- Council reviews recommendations and approves budget

## Using fireworks for Diwali or New Year's Eve?

Only short-range fireworks, those that tend to travel less than 3 metres (10 feet) when set off, are allowed. Examples include fountains, wheels, ground spinners, sparklers. All other fireworks are banned in Brampton, and no fireworks are allowed on sidewalks, at schools parks and other public properties.



# **Safety tips:**



 Keep a container of water or a hose line that's filled with water available to extinguish fireworks



 Never light a firework or hold a lit firework in your hand, other than a sparkler



 After using sparklers, place them in a container of water to fully cool before disposal
