JEFFERSON, JORDAN, AND JAYFIELD PARKS

Living the Mosaic: Brampton 2040 Vision is a strategic plan that conceptualizes how the City of Brampton will evolve until 2040 around seven target visions. "Vision 1: Sustainability and the Environment" states that Brampton will be a mosaic of sustainable urban places, sitting within an interconnected green park network (Eco Park), with its people as environmental stewards - targeting 'one-planet' living.

Through a mosaic of sustainable natural and urban spaces, Brampton Eco Park will be interwoven and embedded into the fabric of the City's urban systems and landscapes, providing harmonious benefits for both residents and nature alike.

Jefferson, Jordan, and Jayfield Parks were selected to help make this vision a reality. The revitalization of the parks will act as pilot projects for Brampton's Eco Park and the One Million Trees Program, while enhancing the city's green space network and community resilience.

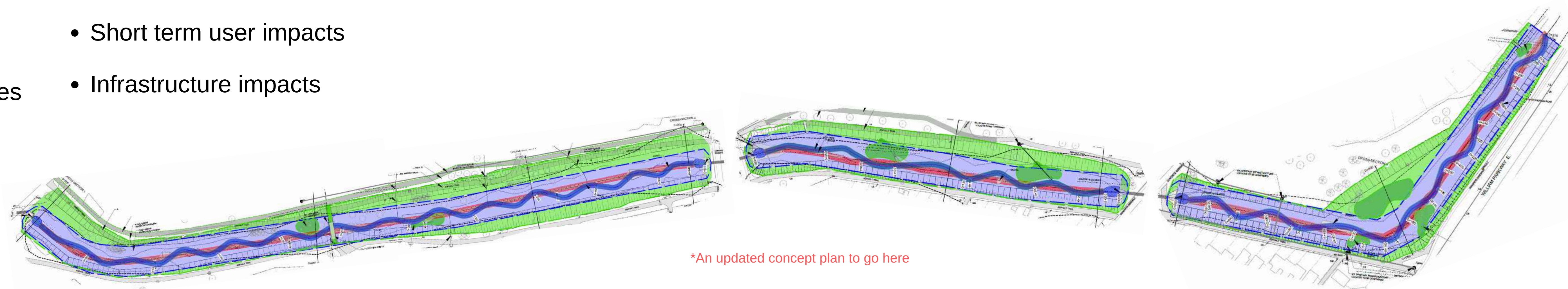

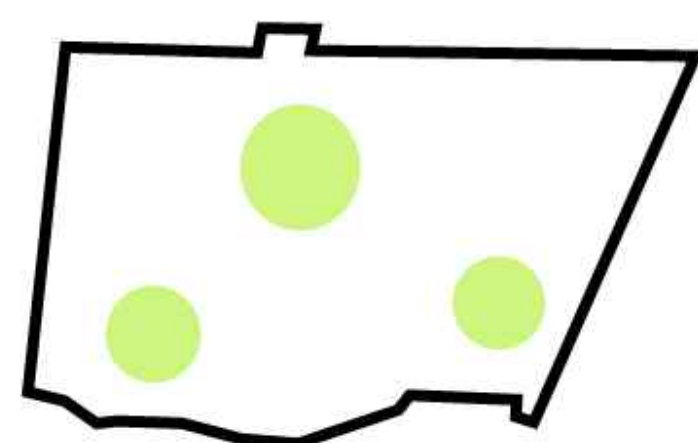
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BRAMPTON ECO PARK PROGRAM

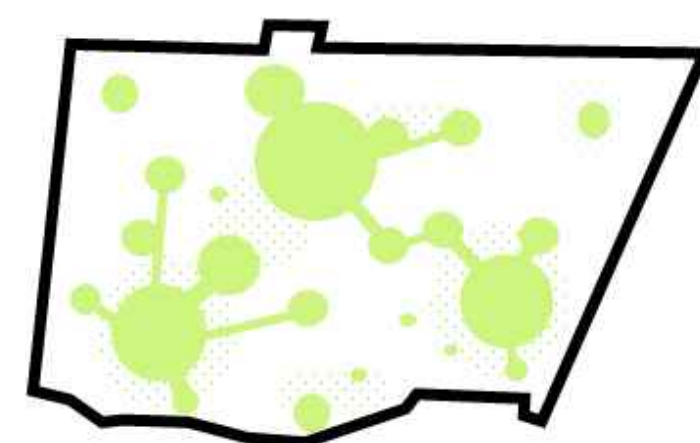


Based on a set of guiding principles, city spaces, including parks and natural heritage features, will be established into Eco Parks with the intention of connecting these areas into a network to eventually form Brampton Eco Park.

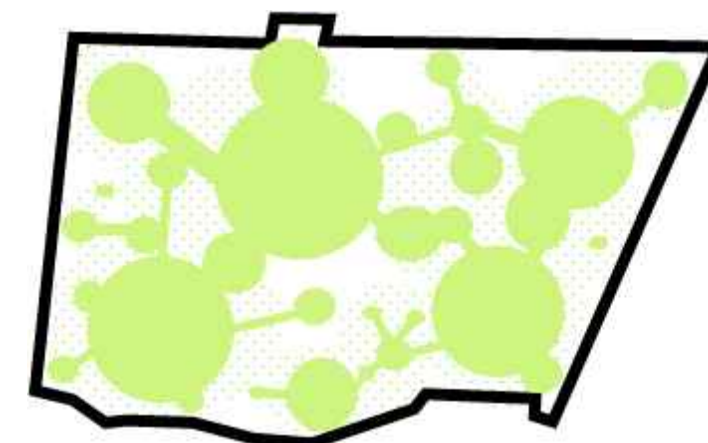
Eco Parks are spaces that reflect local character, provide unique social services, build community cohesion, protect and support City infrastructure while conserving, enhancing, and restoring Brampton's natural landscapes. Eco Parks will foster local stewardship, and encourage active and connected neighbourhoods, generating a strong sense of community.

ECO PARK NETWORK



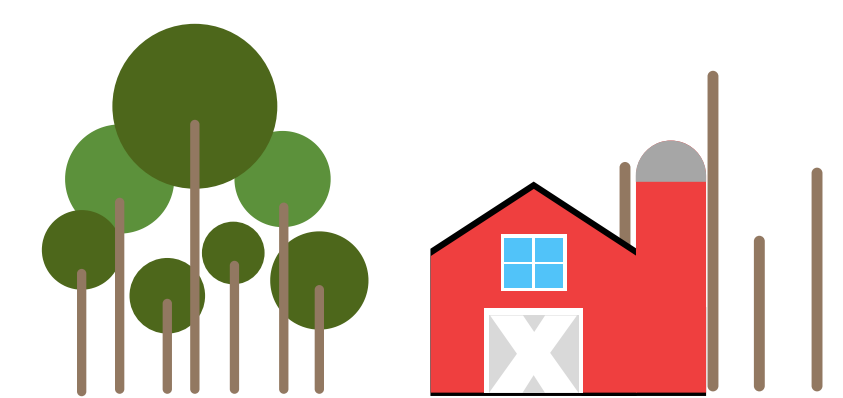

BRAMPTON MILLION TREES PROGRAM

The *Brampton 2040 Vision* also calls for planting one million trees in Brampton by 2040 to enhance its tree canopy cover, help mitigate the effects of climate change, and increase resilience. While the City has good programs and initiatives in place that protect and add new trees, there are several opportunities for us to expand our tree planting efforts.



The City is creating the One Million Trees Program to identify these opportunities and help us reach our target. The four goals of the program are to identify planting opportunities, implement planting strategies and projects, maximize public participation, and monitor and report our progress. Each goal has associated strategies and specific actions.

Through the Adopt-A Park program, the City of Brampton encourages families, neighbours, community groups and businesses to get involved in preserving and enhancing our beautiful parks system. It's a great way to give back to your community.

How does the program work?

Anyone, including individuals, families, businesses, community groups, neighbours, clubs, youth groups, schools etc., can sign up and commit to maintain a City park for at least two years. Within that time, volunteers lead cleanups, environmental stewardship projects, or community development initiatives at least three times a year. We recommend having at least five people in a group.



What does it entail?

All that is required is your time. The City will provide material and staff to help with events.

You may wish to further your involvement by raising funds to plant trees, purchase equipment, improve facilities, or any other initiative to improve your adopted park.

Examples of activities your group can organize:

- Litter cleanups
- Native plantings
- Naturalization projects
- Report vandalism
- Fundraiser events
- Youth Stewardship events
- Park Open House - e.g. educational talks, walks, and workshops

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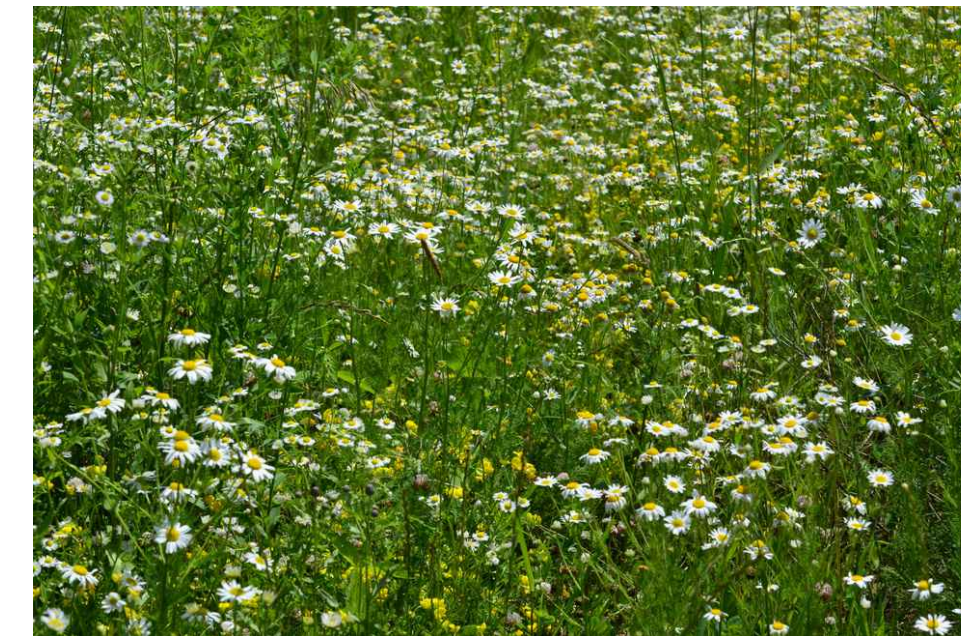

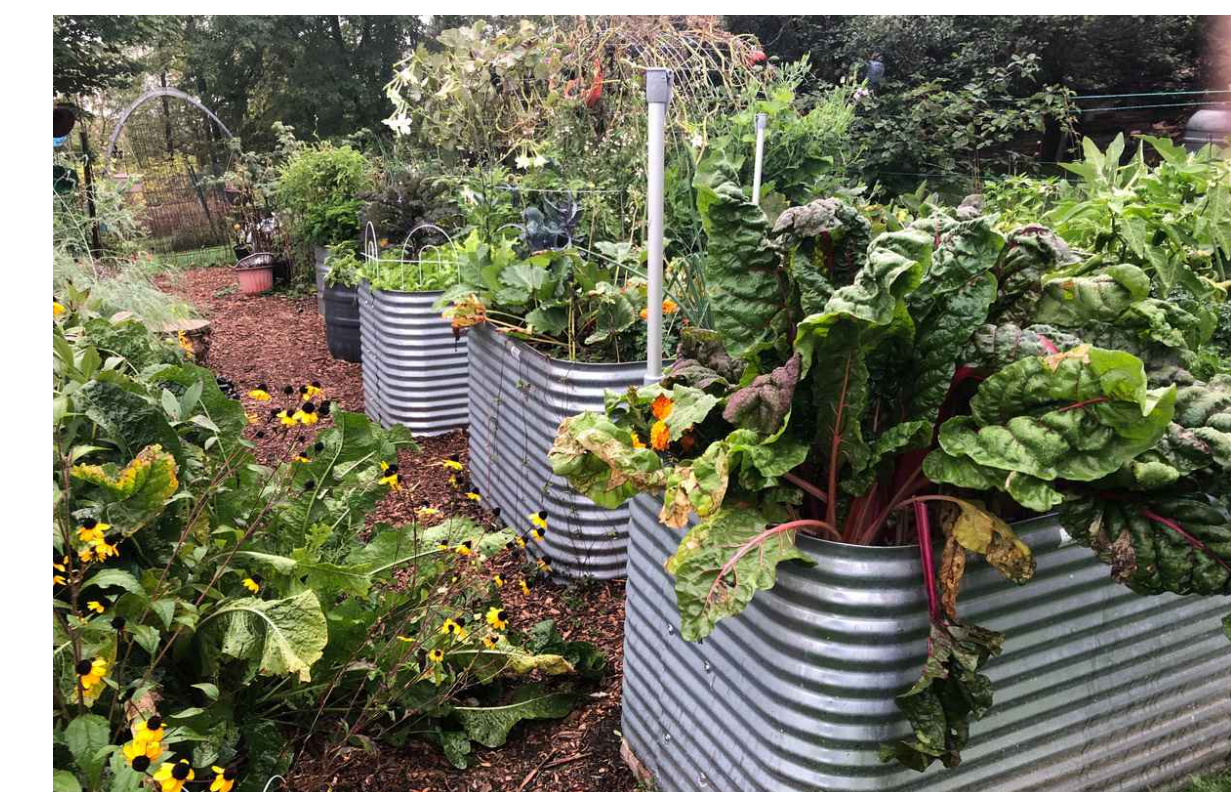
