BUDGET 2026: ZERO INCREASE TO CITY PROPERTY TAX PORTION

BUDGET HIGHLIGHTS:

 0% increase to the City's portion of property taxes for City services

 Record contributions to reserves to protect taxpayers.

 Significant federal and provincial funding secured for city-building projects.

 Additional investment in Brampton's second hospital.

 More by-law officers and stronger fines to enhance public safety.

 Building a safe, affordable and financially resilient city.

The City of Brampton is exercising prudent decision-making to provide the services and infrastructure our growing city needs. **A zero per cent** increase to the City's portion of property taxes for City services, with an additional **1% hospital levy** added to accelerate funding for Brampton's second hospital, keeps the municipal tax rate among the lowest in the GTA. For the average household in Brampton, the 1% levy is equivalent to an annual charge of **\$73**.

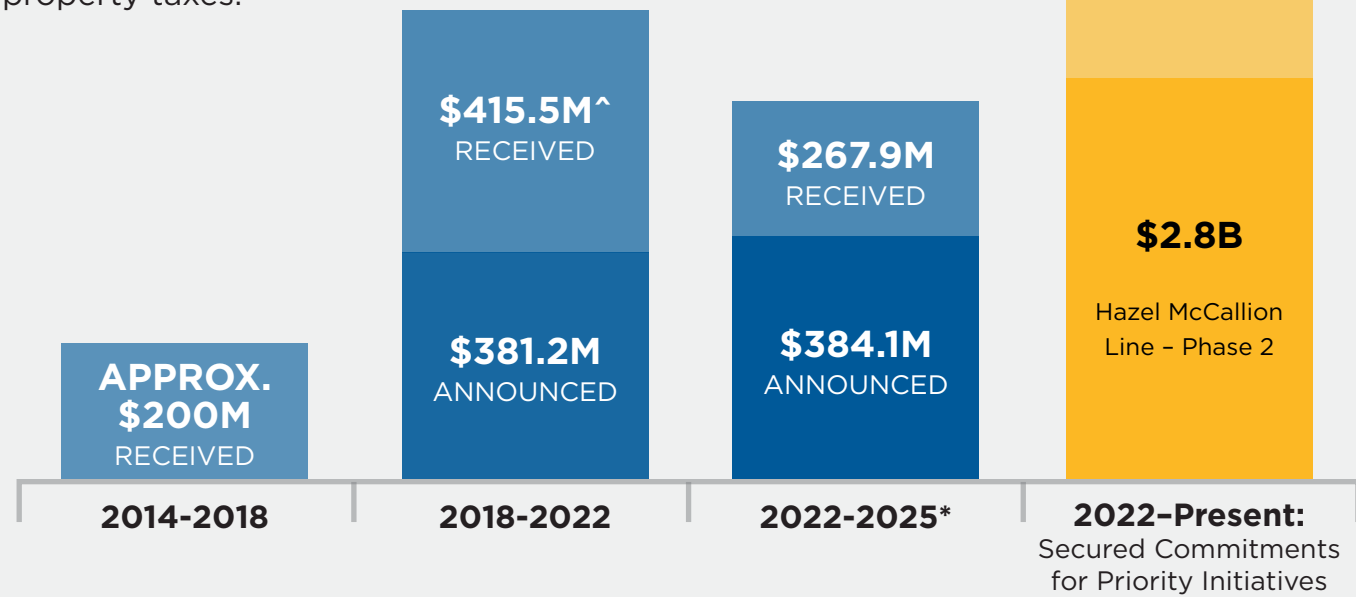

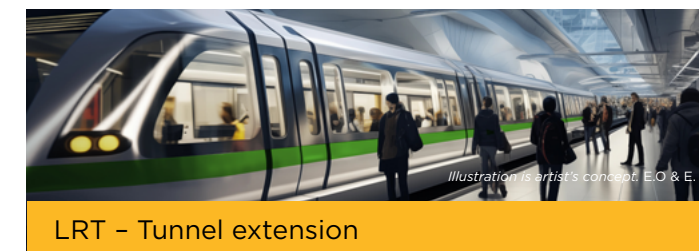


Brampton's federal and provincial funding during Terms of Council

MEETING THE NEEDS OF A GROWING COMMUNITY

Over the 2022-2026 Term of Council, we've committed more than **\$2B** to transformative capital projects that support both today's needs and tomorrow's growth. These investments are about building a city we can be proud of—strengthening neighbourhoods, improving everyday services and creating lasting infrastructure.



PRIORITIZING SAFETY

We continue to address illegal housing, non-compliance and absentee landlords. Our enforcement presence is increasing by 8 part-time and 4 full-time staff to improve parking management and road safety and 10 part-time staff for seasonal enforcement. In addition, 48 full-time and 10 part-time staff will be dedicated to rental housing compliance. We are also adding 24 new firefighters to our team to help ensure timely emergency response across the community.



ELECTRIFYING THE FUTURE OF TRANSIT

We are investing in the electrification of our transit fleet. We will add 44 new electric buses to our existing fleet, helping modernize transit service while reducing emissions. This reflects our commitment to sustainability and to achieving the City's GHG reduction targets.
