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As we welcome spring and new beginnings, there are many new projects in our wards that I'm looking forward to sharing with you.

First, I am proud to champion the addition of a new Brampton public library branch to the Howden Recreation Centre, creating an integrated multi-use community hub for our residents to connect, work and play. This is part of the City's broader Parks and Recreation Master Plan to deliver and dedicate community spaces for investment and meet our infrastructure needs. The project is currently undergoing a design review and I look forward to sharing more updates and milestones soon.

Speaking of libraries, the former Chinguacousy Branch that was in the Bramalea Civic Centre has moved to 8750 The Gore Road, on the second floor of a newly-built office building. In the 11,000 square feet of space, there will be study and programming rooms, surrounded by natural light and part of a commercial plaza that includes a grocery store and other small businesses.

The new branch will be known as the "Claireville Branch," in recognition of the historical village that straddles the nexus of Brampton, Toronto and Mississauga, in addition to its proximity to the Claireville Conservation Area.

I'm happy to chat with my residents about these projects, and any other concerns or issues you may have. Please feel free to reach out to me or my office so we can assist and support you.

As your Councillor, I've heard your concerns about the Chinguacousy library, bike lanes and community safety. Here's how I'm addressing them.

The Civic Centre library was a vital part of our community. Understanding this need, on January 16, I moved a motion with Mayor Brown and in consultation with Councillors Palleschi, Vicente, Brar and Keenan to bring the Chinguacousy Library back. The plan integrates a 30,000 sq. ft. library into the Howden Recreation Centre, restoring lost programming and services.

The library will be near bus routes, schools and bike lanes. To improve cyclist safety, on January 20, I moved a motion to relocate bike lanes from the roadway to boulevards. I've worked with Public Works and Active Transportation to ensure this design enhances safety while maintaining traffic flow. Design on Howden Blvd. begins immediately.

Community safety remains a priority. The City is installing 360-degree cameras and licence plate recognition at 50 key intersections, helping law enforcement investigate crimes and improve safety.

Listening to your concerns and advocating for a community where you can live, work and play safely is my commitment. Stay connected – exciting initiatives are coming!

LICENSING, CREATING SAFER RENTALS FOR ALL

The City of Brampton continues to strengthen its commitment to safe, secure rental housing with its Residential Rental Licensing (RRL) Pilot Program. Property owners with four or fewer units in Wards 1, 3, 4, 5 and 7 must obtain a licence, ensuring that properties meet essential safety standards. The City is waiving the licence application fee for the remainder of 2025 and offering free smoke alarms to residents who obtain a licence. This initiative is part of the City's ongoing efforts to improve housing standards, enhance safety and strengthen the overall well-being of our communities. GROUNDBREAKING AT PEEL MEMORIAL – BRAMPTON'S SECOND HOSPITAL BEGINS CONSTRUCTION

Brampton's second hospital at the Peel Memorial site broke ground on March 28. With \$81.1 million already set aside and another \$4.9 million through the City's annual levy, we're making significant progress in delivering enhanced services to our community.

The new hospital will include:

- A 24/7 Emergency Department
- New and enhanced services for seniors
- New and enhanced mental health and addictions services
- Rehabilitation and complex continuing care services



2025 BRAMPTON BUDGET: DRIVING PROGRESS AND PROSPERITY


The City of Brampton's 2025 Budget reflects our commitment to progress and prosperity through strategic investments in infrastructure, transit, health care and community spaces. With a 2.9% tax levy increase, we continue to prioritize affordability while meeting the needs of our growing population. The City maintains one of the lowest tax rates in the GTA while addressing the needs of our rapidly growing population. A comprehensive operational review has led to over \$2 million in reduced operating costs, ensuring responsible financial management. ANIMAL SAFETY TIPS

As temperatures rise, it's important to protect our pets and local wildlife. Never leave pets in parked cars, as heat can be deadly. Keep them indoors or in shaded areas with fresh water to prevent heatstroke. When outdoors, always leash dogs unless in designated leash-free areas and clean up after them to maintain a safe community.

Avoid feeding wildlife, as it can attract unwanted animals and disrupt ecosystems. Coyotes are more active in warmer months, so always supervise pets outside. Stay informed and ensure their safety. Learn more at brampton.ca/animalservices

Each year, families, friends, community organizations, businesses and school groups participate in the Parks Cleanup Program helping keep Brampton clean and green. The program helps remove litter that has accumulated, promotes community engagement and creates healthy vibrant spaces. 
KEEPING STREETS SAFE

Keeping Our Streets Safe

Be a good neighbour by following parking by-laws to keep our city safe and accessible.

- Avoid parking on the street for more than three hours and refrain from parking between 2 and 6 am.
- Ensure bike lanes remain clear and your vehicle does not overhang sidewalks, lawns or the street.
- Inoperative, immobile or unlicensed vehicles are prohibited on the street.
- Vehicles taller than 2.6 meters or longer than 6.7 meters should not park on residential streets.
- Always park in designated areas, follow street signs and ensure fire routes remain clear.
- Residents can request up to 14 days of parking consideration per vehicle, per year.

TYING THE KNOT? APPLY FOR A MARRIAGE LICENCE

Before getting married in Ontario, you must obtain a marriage licence. Couples who are looking for a simple and dignified approach to exchange their marriage vows can book their ceremony with the City of Brampton. Ceremonies are conducted at Brampton City Hall during office hours from Tuesday to Friday (except for statutory holidays). MAKING TAX PAYMENTS EASIER AND MORE CONVENIENT

Sign up now for the City of Brampton's pre-authorized tax payment program and never have to worry about missing a deadline. You can choose to pay monthly (at the beginning or in the middle of the month) or six times per year and avoid any penalties or interest on late payments. If this plan doesn't work for you, you can still pay by cheque, debit, in person at a bank or through a bank's website. A credit card option is available but additional fees apply for this service. PROPERTY STANDARDS: KEEP BRAMPTON CLEAN, SAFE AND BEAUTIFUL

By-laws help maintain the quality of our city and everyone plays a role in upholding these standards. Following property standards ensures we all enjoy a clean, safe neighbourhood and shared public spaces.

- Maintain your yard by keeping grass under eight inches, trimming vegetation for safety and ensuring proper ground cover to prevent erosion.
- Accessory structures like pools, hot tubs and fences require permits and must meet specific requirements.
- Keep your property free from waste and debris and store waste carts properly.

BABY WILDLIFE IN THE SPRING

Spring is a crucial time for wildlife as many animals are nesting and raising their young. If you see a baby animal alone, do not remove it - its parents are likely nearby and will return when it's safe.

Keep pets away from wildlife to avoid stress or harm. Never feed wild animals, as it disrupts their natural behaviour. If you find a nest in your yard, leave it undisturbed and observe from a distance. For sick or injured wildlife, call 3-1-1.




FIGHT AGAINST FOOD INSECURITY
