A Friendly Reminder: Road Safety Matters!

With the return of school, our top priority is ensuring everyone's safety, particularly on our roads. As the Chair of Public Works and Engineering, community safety is a top priority, and speed limits play a crucial role in protecting cyclists, drivers and pedestrians. Earlier this year, City Council approved a neighbourhood pilot initiative to lower speed limits from 50km/h to 40km/h in selected areas. This program is now active in five pilot regions, including the Royal West Drive and Elbern Markell Drive neighbourhoods in Ward 5.

This autumn, you may notice new traffic calming measures like in-road flexi speed signs, speed humps, or automated speed enforcement cameras in your neighbourhood. It's essential for all to adhere to road regulations. If you witness unsafe driving in your area, please report it via the Peel Regional Police's Road Watch program. RECEIVED A PENALTY NOTICE?

The City is now offering a faster and more flexible process for payment, dispute, and collection of penalties!

Effective this October, through the Administrative Penalty System (APS), individuals can:

- 1. pay the Penalty Notice online, by telephone, in-person, mail, or contacting 311
- 2. request a review by a Screening Officer

The Collaborative Learning Technology Centre (CLTC) at Central Peel Secondary School is opening its doors this fall. BRAMPTON FORWARD: FAIR DEAL FOR INDEPENDENCE

On May 18, 2023, the Province of Ontario introduced Bill 112, Hazel McCallion Act, to make Brampton, Caledon, and Mississauga single-tier municipalities and dissolve the Region of Peel by January 1, 2025. The provincial government has established a five-member transition board to facilitate this change and oversee Peel's financial affairs to ensure prudent financial stewardship until the Region is dissolved. The City of Brampton looks forward to independence and discussions with the Province of Ontario and our regional partners on the division of services like police, paramedics, waste management, and other supports for our rapidly growing city. SUSAN FENNELL SPORTSPLEX YOUTH HUB NOW **OPEN!**

The new youth hub is a dedicated space with a variety of unstructured spaces that allow youth to freely socialize and connect. Young people can access programming and supports, while building meaningful friendships and connections. Other amenities in the space include an eSports area, sponsored by Sheridan College, a creative space, ideation rooms, and a lounge area.

Youth hubs add to the growing amenities available for young people within the city, prioritizing safe, inclusive, and supportive communities. KEEPING PETS SAFE DURING THE COLD

Be a responsible pet owner and protect your pets from the cold. Remember:

- If it's too cold for you, it's too cold for your pet.
- Don't leave your pets in the car.
- Wash and dry your pet's paws and stomach to clean off ice, salt and chemicals.
- Keep your dogs on a leash.
- Don't shave your pet down to the skin in winter fur provides warmth.
- The cold can result in frostbites, hypothermia, and death. Keep them indoors.

SNOW REMOVAL FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE

The City of Brampton has a financial assistance program for seniors and physically challenged homeowners to help with costs for removing snow from sidewalks and driveways. PERMITS REQUIRED TO DISPLAY SIGNS

Permits must be requested to display signs on buildings or in the ground in Brampton. All signs, temporary or permanent, are regulated to help keep pedestrians and drivers safe from distractions and avoid visual clutter in the city. FIREWORKS BAN

Under the Fireworks By-law, the use, purchase, discharge, possession, display, sale, and offer to sell of fireworks is strictly prohibited in Brampton. Penalties for failing to comply range from \$500 to \$1,000 and may reach up to \$100,000 if a court summons is issued. The City is dedicated to creating an inclusive environment. REMINDERS

SMOKE AND CARBON MONOXIDE ALARM MAINTENANCE TIPS

House fires can be devastating, causing a great deal of property damage and putting your family at risk. Maintenance ensures your smoke and carbon monoxide alarms keep you safe.

- Install working smoke alarms on every storey of your home and outside all sleeping areas.
- Install working carbon monoxide alarms beside all sleeping areas.
- Test alarms monthly.
- Replace alarms that are 10 years old or older.
- Replace batteries at least once a year.

As the City continues to develop and expand, the number of people requiring barrier-free parking also increases. Access to accessible parking is important for people with disabilities to be able to enjoy services and facilities. Accessible Parking Permits are issued free of charge to qualified individuals through the Province of Ontario.
