Students are gearing up for back-to-school and we are all getting ready to welcome the cooler weather and fall foliage after a whirlwind summer in the city. The summer months flew by with Brampton enthralled in cricket fever, a successful Hockey Night in Brampton, and so many community events, meetings and celebrations in Wards 2 & 6.

We had the honour of unveiling Trincomalee Park, a new park in Wards 2 & 6, named in recognition of the contributions to cultural diversity that the Trincomalee community has made to Brampton. Brampton is home to the largest number of parks in the Greater Toronto Area and our residents take pride in their community parks, advocating for their improvement and maintenance. Our dedicated City staff keep the parks and trails in our communities safe, clean, and are routinely improving them.

The second annual Hockey Night in Brampton was a resounding success! Hockey stars were out in full, and the stadium was fully packed as the game got underway. It was an action-packed game with the two opposing teams headed by hockey superstars John Tavares and Mark Giordano. Fans also had the opportunity to meet and get autographs from hockey legends Doug Gilmour, Wendel Clark, and Darry Sittler. With the help of our community and sponsors, we were able to raise \$1 million in support of the William Osler Health System and the second hospital in Brampton. We also raised \$100,000 for the John Tavares Foundation, which makes this one of the biggest charity hockey games in Canada.

We continue to show our commitment to community safety. We are planning a community safety town hall in the fall so that we can touch base with our residents and let them bring their questions and concerns to the table. ADVANCE BRAMPTON FUND



NOISE AND PUBLIC NUISANCE BY-LAWS

Be a courteous neighbour and keep excessive noise down. Under the City's Noise By-law, persistent and recurring noise that causes disturbances to other Brampton residents can be enforced. Under the updated Public Nuisance By-Law, excessive noise and emissions from motor vehicles and power devices are prohibited and regulated. BRAMPTON FORWARD: FAIR DEAL FOR INDEPENDENCE

On May 18, 2023, the Province of Ontario introduced Bill 112, Hazel McCallion Act, to make Brampton, Caledon, and Mississauga single-tier municipalities and dissolve the Region of Peel by January 1, 2025. The provincial government has established a five-member transition board to facilitate this change and oversee Peel's financial affairs to ensure prudent financial stewardship until the Region is dissolved. The City of Brampton looks forward to independence and discussions with the Province of Ontario and our regional partners on the division of services like police, paramedics, waste management, and other supports for our rapidly growing city. SNOW REMOVAL FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE

The City of Brampton has a financial assistance program for seniors and physically challenged homeowners to help with costs for removing snow from sidewalks and driveways. PERMITS REQUIRED TO DISPLAY SIGNS

Permits must be requested to display signs on buildings or in the ground in Brampton. All signs, temporary or permanent, are regulated to help keep pedestrians and drivers safe from distractions and avoid visual clutter in the city. FIREWORKS BAN

Under the Fireworks By-law, the use, purchase, discharge, possession, display, sale, and offer to sell of fireworks is strictly prohibited in Brampton. Penalties for failing to comply range from \$500 to \$1,000 and may reach up to \$100,000 if a court summons is issued. The City is dedicated to creating an inclusive environment. SMOKE AND CARBON MONOXIDE ALARM MAINTENANCE TIPS

House fires can be devastating, causing a great deal of property damage and putting your family at risk. Maintenance ensures your smoke and carbon monoxide alarms keep you safe.

- Install working smoke alarms on every storey of your home and outside all sleeping areas.
- Install working carbon monoxide alarms beside all sleeping areas.
- Test alarms monthly.
- Replace alarms that are 10 years old or older.
- Replace batteries at least once a year.

Access to accessible parking is important for people with disabilities to be able to enjoy services and facilities. Accessible Parking Permits are issued free of charge to qualified individuals through the Province of Ontario.
