Dear Friends,

We are now more than two years into the 2018-2022 term of Council, and it has been an honour to serve as your area Regional and City Councillors. While the COVID-19 pandemic has shifted priorities at the City of Brampton, we have still accomplished much together.

Automated Speed Enforcement cameras were launched across the city to help reduce speeding, several located in Wards 3 and 4. We have welcomed a new Police substation in Downtown Brampton, and have begun planning for a Youth Hub at South Fletchers Sportsplex. Council has implemented three consecutive zero per cent tax increases, and have launched four new partnerships within the Innovation District to enhance economic presence in Downtown Brampton. The City of Brampton has also secured funding for the Riverwalk project and several transit projects.

The City of Brampton has also recently welcomed the Province of Ontario's announcements to fund the expansion of Peel Memorial into a new hospital that will include more than 250 net new beds and expand urgent care to 24/7 operations, in addition to financial support for the development of a new institute of medical education in Brampton in partnership with Ryerson University.

Our COVID-19 task forces have done exceptional work supporting Brampton residents. Our COVID-19 task forces have done exceptional work supporting Brampton residents. Our Social Support Task Force has coordinated over 3,000 grocery and meal requests, while the Seniors Support Task Force arranged 388 grocery deliveries and managed 418 inquiries for grocery support and referrals to government and community agencies. The City also facilitated 51 Digital Café meetings for seniors. Our Youth Support Task Force continues to work with more than 40 community youth groups/organizations to provide youth access to programming and resources, our Economic Development Task Force connected with over 10,000 small businesses, and our Reopening and Recovery Working Group engaged with more than 8,000 residents during the recovery-specific Tele Town Hall. With the vaccine rollout currently underway, we encourage you and your family to get your vaccination when made available to you. Please continue to wear a mask, keep a social distance and wash your hands regularly.


BRAMPTON PLANOfficial Plan Review Engagement

It guides the location and type of housing, industry, offices, stores, as well as the infrastructure needed to support a growing city – including streets, parks, transit, schools, and recreational facilities.

Registering second units (basement apartments) with the City ensures that they are safe, legal and livable. It helps the City provide the unit with its own municipal address. This information is shared with Brampton Fire, in case of an emergency, they will know there is a second unit in your house before they arrive. This can save precious seconds in a life-or-death situation. The registry is also available on the City's website allowing residents to confirm if a property is legally registered. For illegal second units, fines could go up to \$25,000.


Until November, residents and businesses are encouraged to register for self-led clean ups at one of our many parks.

BRAMPTON RELEASES UPDATED ENVIRONMENTAL MASTER PLAN

On March 24, 2021, Brampton City Council unanimously approved the update of the Brampton Grow Green Environmental Master Plan (EMP), building on its commitment to being a Green City. The update of this pivotal document highlights the City of Brampton's environmental successes and how the environmental priorities have evolved since the EMP was first released in 2014, and provides a refreshed Action Plan to drive these goals forward. The Action Plan features 60 high-impact actions that chart the course for a greener city over the next decade, and will accelerate Brampton as a healthy, resilient, and environmentally sustainable community.













CREATING SPACE FOR BRAMPTON'S YOUTH

On March 5, the Government of Canada, Government of Ontario and the City of Brampton announced funding for the Community Youth Hub at Susan Fennel Sportsplex (formerly South Fletcher's Sportsplex). This initiative will provide Brampton youth with a safe and accessible space to participate in youth-specific programs, services and activities.

Enhancing access to youth-centric spaces is part of the City of Brampton's Parks and Recreation Master Plan. The City of Brampton plans to convert space at two recreation centres - Susan Fennel Sportsplex and Century Gardens Recreation Centre - into Community Youth Hubs, offering youth safe and welcoming spaces that act as one-stop shops for services and activities for young people across the city.



Now that the weather is warming up, it means barbeque season is upon us. Follow these tips to make this a firesafe barbeque season:

- Clean, inspect and test all connection lines
- Never leave a lit BBQ unattended
- Never BBQ inside your garage
- Do not place the BBQ close to anything that can burn
- To avoid a fire, make sure grease does not build up on the burners or at the base of the BBQ
- Keep children and pets a safe distance away
- Turn off all fuel sources after use and leave the lid open to let it cool before you safely store it away

YARD MAINTENANCE

By-laws help everyone enjoy a clean, safe neighbourhood and shared public spaces. On your private property, keep grass cut to 20 cm (8 inches) or shorter, and trim trees and hedges to avoid overgrowth. Remove stagnant water (often accumulated in wading pools, pool covers, buckets, etc.), and be sure not to store damaged or partially working items or debris on your property.

USING FIREWORKS FOR VICTORIA DAY, CANADA DAY, DIWALI AND NEW YEAR'S EVE?



Only short-range fireworks, those that tend to travel less than three metres (10 feet) when set off, are allowed on Victoria Day, Canada Day, Diwali and New Year's Eve. Examples include fountains, wheels, ground spinners, sparklers. All other fireworks are banned in Brampton, and no fireworks are allowed on sidewalks, at schools, parks and other public properties.

SAFETY TIPS:



Keep a container of water or a hose line that's filled with water available to extinguish fireworks



Never light a firework or hold a lit firework in your hand, other than a sparkler




After using sparklers, place them in a container of water to fully cool before disposal



ACCESSIBLE PARKING

One in seven Ontarians has a disability, and not all disabilities are visible. Be mindful of accessible parking spots. If you park next to an accessible parking space, don't park over the yellow-striped access aisles. They provide additional space for those with disabilities to get in and out of vehicles with ease. Drive slow when you are near accessible parking areas and close to building entrances.

A MESSAGE FROM YOUR COUNCILLORS

COUNCILLOR MEDEIROS

Dear Friends.

As Regional Councillor and lead of the Reopening and Recovery Working Group, I would like to thank you for your resilience and patience during this difficult time. I know we are eager to return to normal but we must continue to follow Peel Public Health guidelines for the safety of our family, friends, and community. I encourage you to visit peelregion.ca for regular vaccination and COVID-19 updates.

I am thrilled the City of Brampton has successfully advocated in a number of key areas including healthcare and youth services by securing investments from our provincial and federal partners towards a Community Youth Hub at South Fletchers Sportsplex and a second hospital in Brampton.

Wards 3 and 4 will also receive a Campus of Care facility operated by Golden Age Village for the Elderly (GAVE) at Flower City Community Campus. This will include a 160-bed long-term care home and a 140-unit affordable housing unit. I am proud to have worked with GAVE on this project over the past year.

Recently, Council passed a number of my motions including directing City staff to:

- Consult with Metrolinx on the potential electrification of the Downtown Brampton Transit Hub
- Report to Council with a plan to publish the City's organizational chart to increase openness and accountability
- Make our GeoHub Open Data Portal more accessible and user-friendly
- Enter into discussions with Rogers Cybersecure Catalyst at Ryerson University to establish a Police Cybercrime Training Centre in Brampton

I will continue to work hard for the residents of Wards 3 and 4 and move Brampton forward.

LLEGAL& UNSAFE SECOND UNITS



The issue of illegal and unsafe second units continues to grow in the city, especially in our Wards. The revolving door of tenants crammed into one home in our family-friendly neighbourhood is becoming a sprawling rental zone, with cars parked on expanded driveways, the front lawn or up and down the street at all times of the day and night.

I've been very vocal and active on fighting this issue with our staff. In 2018, Brampton's Second Unit Task Force was created to investigate illegal dwelling units in multi-unit homes. Since then, I have reached out to and connected with multiple members of government including Premier Ford outlining the concerns of increasing illegal and unsafe second units, and your local MPP and MP requesting international enrollment so we can properly account for the number of housing units needed to support these students better. I also met with Solicitor General Jones and Minister Steve Clark to discuss this issue. I will continue to voice my concerns to ensure that all residents, tenants and property owners are safe.



The City of Brampton employs around 6,000 people in various departments and facilities. Due to COVID, many have been forced to work from home – which is tough, but an added stress when dealing with little ones or young children doing online classes. We thank you for your continued commitment to the City and our residents while finding your work-life balance during these difficult times.
