for Hate Crime Victims in Brampton

The City of Brampton has partnered with Peel Regional Police to support its Safe Place program. This initiative provides a secure location for victims of hate-motivated crimes and incidents in the LGBTQ+ community to report the hate-motivated crime and to get the assistance they need with compassion and dignity.

Under the program, publicly accessible City of Brampton buildings will be designated as 'safe places' and will visibly display a symbolic decal at the main entrances. The decal will serve to notify hate-motivated crime victims that the facility and its staff stand ready to provide them with shelter and with assistance in contacting the police.

The City's participation in such programs contributes to our collective efforts to make Brampton a safer, more secure and inclusive place for all.



LIGHTHOUSE OPTIONS IN TIMES OF PUBLIC EMERGENCY

This summer, the City will be launching the Lighthouse Program during Emergency Preparedness Week from May 5 to 11. Led by the Brampton Emergency Management Office, the program works with local faith-based organizations that agree to open their facilities to the public for refuge during times of emergency.

Do you live in a rented property? Did you know that the City's Zoning By-law prohibits more than three lodgers or boarders from residing together in one dwelling unit? These rules are in place to ensure suitable living conditions and to avoid overcrowding which could pose various risks to your health and safety.

When searching for rental listings, if the unit you plan to rent is a basement apartment, make sure the unit is legal. Check the webpage **www.brampton.ca/secondunits** to see if the rental property is registered with the City.



LOAFER'S LAKE RECREATION CENTRE UPGRADES

Located at 30 Loafer's Lake Lane (*Kennedy Road and Sandalwood Parkway*), improvements to this facility will include:

- new fitness change rooms
- family change rooms
- a sensory room
- refurbishments to the lobby, pool and parking lot
- improved accessibility

A number of mechanical upgrades will also be completed to modernize the building's electrical and HVAC systems. The Centre will be closed for renovations beginning May 1, 2019, and will reopen in Fall 2020. Facility users and program participants will be accommodated at other City of Brampton recreation centres for the duration of the closure.

Replanting of Brampton's Valley Lands

The Brampton Valleys Renaturalization Planting Program was established in 2002 with the goal to renaturalize our valley lands in the Credit River, Etobicoke Creek and West Humber watersheds with native tree and shrub plantings.

Now in its 17th year, the program has resulted in the planting of more than 350 hectares of valley land, with over 20,000 native trees and 240,000 native shrubs planted to date.



This year, we will be planting 1,200 trees and 9,000 shrubs in the West Humber and Etobicoke Creek watersheds. Three sites will be planted and work will start this May/June.

The program results in a variety of ecological benefits, such as introducing new wildlife habitat, improving fish habitat by stream cooling, and flood plain stabilization. The social benefits of the program are also significant as the new plantings add to the attractiveness of these valley lands, promoting casual use of the valleys by hikers, naturalists and community groups.
