LEADING HATE PREVENTION THROUGH GLOBAL PARTNERSHIP

The City of Brampton's Government Relations, CSWO, and Equity Office, in partnership with the Strong Cities Network and Foundation for a Path Forward hosted a two-day workshop earlier this year on City-Led Hate Prevention in Times of Global Crisis. The event was held at City Hall and the Alderlea and featured panel discussions, remarks and presentations by Mayor Brown and Councillors, Peel Regional Police officials, and local and international experts in the fields of community safety, countering hate and extremism, and building resilient communities. Multiple City staff from various divisions were among the experts who participated in engaging panel discussions.

Brampton joined the Strong Cities Network in 2024, which is made up of more than 270 member cities from across the globe. Member cities are committed to building social cohesion and resilience against extremism, hate, and polarization.
