NOTICE OF PUBLIC INFORMATION CENTRE GOREWAY DRIVE IMPROVEMENTS and RAILWAY OVERPASS

Brandon Gate Drive to Steeles Avenue
City of Brampton and City of Mississauga

The Cities of Brampton and Mississauga are jointly tendering improvements to Goreway Drive from Brandon Gate Drive to approximately 250 metres south of Steeles Avenue.

The proposed improvements include:

- New bridge crossing over the CN railway tracks;
- Construction of new retaining walls along Goreway;
- Replacement of the existing culvert at Mimico Creek;
- Full roadway reconstruction;
- Widening to four lanes, where necessary;
- Replacement of existing watermain and sewers; and
- New curbs, sidewalk, multi-use trail and landscaping

In order to minimize the total duration of construction, both City Councils have approved **CLOSING Goreway Drive between Brandon Gate Drive and Kenview Boulevard for a period of 12 to 15 months** starting spring 2019. Users will be required to detour around the work zone until the new bridge crossing is opened.

A one-month closure of Goreway Drive between Steeles Avenue and Kenview Boulevard will also be required to reconstruct this section of Goreway Drive. Advanced notice and local access to all businesses in this area will be provided during this closure via established detour routes.

The City of Brampton and the City of Mississauga would like to increase public awareness of the road closure and construction scheduled to commence in early 2019. Project updates will be on the Cities' websites and you are invited to attend a Public Information Centre and discuss any concerns you may have with City representatives.

'GUNS AND GANGS DON'T ACTUALLY RESPECT BORDERS': PEEL WANTS BOOST TOO AS TORONTO COPS GETS \$100M FROM PROVINCE

"Toronto is receiving funds from the province and I would like to see Mississauga and Brampton get a share of that," Evans added. "My concern is for my community and for my officers responding to these calls. My hope is these additional funds will help alleviate the strain."

The mayors of Brampton and Mississauga are in support of Peel police.

"The chief and I both believe that Toronto shouldn't be the only place that gets that infusion of cash to make sure that we're properly resourced. The guns and gangs don't actually respect borders," said Brampton Mayor Linda Jeffrey.

"I also spoke to (Michael) Tibollo about a letter out chief had written to the minister indicating her desire for additional funding for Peel Regional Police with respect to the increasing gun violence," said Jeffrey.

"She (Evans) had written to him probably the beginning of August or mid-August indicating that the City of Toronto was able to get some additional money for increased gun violence, and her ask was that the money not just go to one city in the province because we in Peel are facing very similar concerns," add-

ed Jeffrey.

"I related to the minister that, it's my understanding Peel Regional Police are investigating their 17th homicide for the year, and six of the 17 homicides were committed with a firearm," Jeffrey said.

"Mississauga residents need to feel safe in their community. Crime and community safety are growing concerns for many residents in Mississauga and Peel Region. While Mississauga remains one of the safest cities in Canada - in fact we remain well below the provincial and national averages for violent crime - there is a perception that crime is on the rise," added Mississauga Mayor Bonnie Crombie.

"As an elected official, it's important that I not only respond to these concerns but also find ways to help enhance community safety," Crombie added. "There is no easy solution to crime; it requires both enforcement, but also prevention and addressing the root causes of crime."

"First and foremost, Peel Regional Police need to be properly resourced in order to do their jobs effectively and help keep our community safe," said Crombie.
