

CONVENIENT WAYS TO PAY YOUR PROPERTY TAXES

The City must receive all payments in the tax office by the due date to avoid penalty and interest charges.

1. Pre-Authorized Tax Payment Plan (PTP)



Automatic withdrawal from your bank account every month: there are no fees for enrolling in the plan. See www.brampton.ca for details.

2. Internet/Telephone Banking



Through internet banking and/or telephone banking: use your 17 digit roll number as the account number.

3. At a Bank or Other Financial Institution



Payable at most banks or trust companies. (Note: Financial institutions may charge for this service).

4. Credit Card



Credit card payments are not accepted directly by the City of Brampton. Property Taxes can be paid by credit card using an online bill payment service provider such as PlastiQ or Paytm. The service provider may charge service fees. Please refer to the service provider's website for terms and conditions of their service, charges and payment processing times.

5. By Mail



Mail cheque payment to: City of Brampton, P.O. Box 4263 Station A, Toronto ON, M5W 5T5. Include your 17-digit Tax Roll Number on each cheque. Post-dated cheques accepted.

6. In-Person



Drop box for cheque payments is available at City Hall lobby (2 Wellington St. W) adjacent to the parking garage elevator.

If you want to pay at the cashier counter, you must first book an appointment at www.brampton.ca/SkipTheLine. Note, cash payments are not accepted. With a confirmed appointment, you can pay at City Hall, 2 Wellington Street West, 1st floor (debit, cheque accepted) or at Service Brampton Centre, Civic Centre, 150 Central Park Drive, main floor (debit and cheques accepted).



2021 Commercial Industrial Multi-Residential

Third consecutive tax freeze and record contribution to City reserves. Brampton is the only large Canadian city with three consecutive tax freezes.



This flyer has important information about your final tax bill for 2021.

Each year, the City sends out two tax bills and residents must pay both bills:


- **Interim Tax Bill** was mailed out in January with payments due on February 17, March 24 and April 21. In response to COVID-19 and to support taxpayers facing financial hardship from the pandemic, Brampton City Council approved an optional Property Tax Payment Deferral Program for 2021 taxes. If you applied to defer your interim tax bill and were successful, your final tax bill was deferred until December 15, 2021. Please remember to make the payment by December 15, 2021 to avoid any penalties and interest. Overdue payments are indicated in the Account Summary section on your tax bill and are due immediately.
- **Final Tax Bill** is mailed out in July with payment due dates of August 18, September 22 and October 20. The enclosed statement is your final tax bill.



In 2020, the City of Brampton maintained its advocacy efforts with Federal and Provincial governments for pandemic and infrastructure-related funding, and focused internally on efficiencies. This helped offset the financial impacts and maintain a stable financial position for 2021.

CITY OF BRAMPTON BUDGET 2021

On December 9, 2020, Brampton City Council unanimously approved the 2021 Budget with a **record \$114M contribution** to reserves (the largest ever in the City's history) and a **third consecutive tax freeze**. Brampton is the only large Canadian city with three consecutive tax freezes. This is also the **lowest impact on Brampton property tax in the past 10 years**.



2021 TAXES

The 2021 Budget supports the Brampton community through the current pandemic, and continues to strengthen the City for future growth, connectivity and sustainability. The City's total operating budget is increasing by \$13.4M to enhance services but with no property tax increases. The budget also includes levies for Transit and Infrastructure to meet the growing needs of our city.

Overall property tax impact:


0% City of Brampton + 1% Region of Peel + 0% School Boards = 1% property tax increase.

Note: individual tax bills may increase or decrease, depending on MPAC assessed value.

Property tax and how does it work?

Property tax is a major source of revenue for a municipality. Property taxes collected in Brampton are divided into three – School Boards (Province of Ontario), Region of Peel and the City of Brampton. Every dollar of the property tax collected in 2021 will be divided as follows:

	Multi-Residential	Commercial	Industrial
City	48%	29%	31%
Region	42%	25%	27%
Education	10%	46%	42%

2021 BUDGET HIGHLIGHTS

1. Supporting and Strengthening:

- \$175M towards third transit maintenance and storage facility
- Finalize "Housing Brampton" – City's first Affordable Housing Strategy
- \$1M per ward to promote healthy community living
- Accessible baseball diamond (with Toronto Blue Jays and Peel District School Board)
- \$250K to support Community Gardens and Backyard Garden Program
- Cricket field enhancements and first full-sized cricket field with lighting
- New sports dome at Brampton Soccer Centre, for year-round training access
- Revitalization of Balmoral Community Centre, Chris Gibson Community Centre, Howden Community Centre, and Victoria Park Indoor Sports Complex
- Youth Hubs at Century Gardens Recreation Centre and South Fletchers' Sportsplex

- Strengthen the Innovation District in downtown Brampton through: Brampton Entrepreneur Centre, Rogers Cybersecure Catalyst, Ryerson Venture Zone, Research Innovation and Commercialization Centre

- \$2.1M towards B-Hive, an incubator initiative
- \$2.4M towards Algoma University expansion in downtown Brampton
- Launch Phase I of the Pan-Canadian Battery Electric Bus Trial into service
- Plant 50,000 trees as part of the Brampton One Million Trees Program
- Support the construction of Hurontario Light Rail Transit (LRT) project (Phase 1)
- \$26.1M over three years as part of City investment with the Riverwalk project
- Begin projects in Active Transportation Master Plan for connected pedestrian and cycling network

IMPORTANT INFORMATION

Due dates: To avoid penalties and interest charges, property taxes must be paid by the due dates shown on your tax bill.

New Owner Account Administration Fee: An administration fee will be added to all accounts where property ownership has changed. A statement will be sent to the owner for payment.

New Account Administration Fee: If a property is new to the tax roll, a one-time administration fee will be added to cover the costs associated with setting up the account. A statement will be sent to the owner for payment.

Charity Rebate: A registered charity occupying commercial/industrial property may be eligible for a rebate of a portion of property taxes. For information and application go to www.brampton.ca and search charity rebate.

Tax sale: On January 1, properties with taxes outstanding for two years may become eligible for Tax Sale proceedings as regulated by Part XI, Section 373 (1) of the Municipal Act.

Tax adjustment: Under limited circumstances, property owners may apply to the Treasurer, in writing for cancellation, reduction or refund on all or part of taxes levied. For information and application go to www.brampton.ca and search for Tax Appeals.

Your property assessment: If you have concerns about your property assessment, contact the Municipal Property Assessment Corporation (MPAC). Visit www.mpac.ca or call 1-866-296-MPAC (6722).
